
Pupils in Years 4 - 6 take part in our flagship TYR programme and receive the most engaging weekly Maths and English tutorials.

Tutors United Highlights

Math Results

On average pupils increased their Maths results by 51% after 13 hours of tutoring.



72% of pupils were below average at the start of the year. After 13 hours of tutoring, 43% were average, and 21% were above average!



67% of EAL pupils were below average at the start of the year. After 13 hours of tutoring, 38% were average, and 28% were above average.



87% of Black Caribbean pupils were below average at the start of the year. After 13 hours of tutoring, 35% were achieving average and higher.



English Results

On average pupils progressed in writing by two sub levels after 13 hours of tutoring



On average pupils, Year Related Expectation increased from a Year 3 to a Year 4 standard after 13 hours of tutoring



Pupils achieving Year 4, 5 and 6 writing standards by the end of the programme increased by 58%



On average EAL pupils progressed in writing by two sub levels and pupils achieving Year 4, 5 and 6 standards increased by 59%

Maths **Progress**

To track our pupil's progress, we assess the pupils before starting tuition and provide an identical assessment at the end of the programme (with different numbers). After 13 hours of Maths tutoring:

Pupil assessment results increased by 51.1% from an average of 36.7% to 55.4%


Do you understand how impressive that is? If not, here is another way to look at it. At the start of the programme 159 of our pupils scored below-average results (under 50%) and 52 scored average results (50% - 74%). After 13 hours of tutoring, the number of below-average results decreased by a whopping 49.7%!

The number of pupils achieving above average results (75% and above) increased by a humungous 411% from 9 pupils to 46 pupils!





"50% of pupils whose first language is other than English reached the expected standard in all of reading, writing and mathematics, lower than the national average and compared with 54% of pupils whose first language is English."

What about our pupils who statistically face more challenges?

Pupils with English as an additional language (EAL) often make minimal progress for many factors. A lack of fluency in English, for example, can make it difficult to comprehend and answer questions, especially word problems which are common in the SATs. However, we are super proud to say that our pupils from EAL backgrounds made fantastic progress; from initially being below average, they increased their Maths results by 51.7% after only

13 hours of tutoring, placing them firmly in the average category with an average score of 57.7%. In the Department for Education's 2016 National Curriculum Key Stage 2 assessments, pupils from a Black Caribbean background were the lowest performing major group. Research by the Cabinet Office Strategy Unit has shown an interaction between economic group, ethnicity and educational achievement – whereby factors such as household income and low

expectations of teachers result in lower attainment levels for these pupils. Our pupils from Black Caribbean backgrounds made outstanding progress, increasing their Maths results on average by 54.7%. Although the average score remains 8 percentage points away from average, we are confident that with a few more additional hours of support, our pupils will break through the next threshold!

English Progress

With the aim to prepare our superstars for secondary school, TU English lessons focus on writing different types of text incorporating handwriting, writers voice, spelling, punctuation, and grammar in the lessons. Topics range from persuasive writing, quest fiction, argument and debate, tales from other cultures, SLAM poetry and much more.



How do we assess pupil writing?

To track pupil progress, we assess our pupils' writing throughout the programme. The initial and final assessments are compared to evaluate the progress in pupils' writing abilities after receiving English tuition.


Using an assessment tool developed by literacy consultants to fit the new National Curriculum, pupils are given a year-related expectation of Year 2, 3, 4, 5 or 6. Pupils are also given sub-

levels: Emerging (E), Secure (S) or Advanced (A). Ideally, the overall year-related standard that a pupil receives should be consistent or higher than the year they are in at school. After only 13 hours of English tutoring

- Pupils' writing improved by two sub-levels on average
- The average Year Related Expectation in writing increased from a Year 3 to a Year 4 standard

Let's put the levels in more context – our pupils are in Years 4, 5 and 6, however before tutoring only 40% of the pupils were writing at a Year 4 or 5 standard. After only 13 hours of tutoring, a whopping 63% of pupils were achieving the top three writing standards (Year 4, 5 and 6). Considering the topics increase in difficulty each term, that is fantastic progress!


Year Related Expectation Achievement

Percentage Change in EAL Pupils Achieving Top Three Writing Levels




Percentage of pupils achieving Year 4, 5 & 6 writing standards


Considering EAL pupils face language barriers, our EAL pupils made huge progress with the number of pupils achieving the top three-writing standards increasing by 59.5% after just 13 hours of tutoring. These writing standards reflect the pupils' year groups and higher, which is fantastic. Hard work pays off – a huge well done to our EAL pupils!

Long-Term Impact



Parent feedback





We will not be working with each of our amazing pupils forever (although we'd love to!). That is why we work closely with our pupil's enthusiastic parents and provide the necessary training to ensure they know how to support their child's learning. We do want to build the bridge between school and home after all.

In addition to our pupil's lessons, over the year we delivered 182 parent sessions, which provided parents with additional guidance on their child's strengths and weaknesses as well as training them on all the tricky topics their children need to learn – as the methods are very different to what they were 15-years ago!

We are very pleased that by the end of the programme 100% of our parents were more aware of how their child was progressing and 97% felt more able to support their child's learning at home!

So our pupils make brilliant progress, but what happens after they leave the programme?

In early 2018 we followed up with a random sample of 78 pupils who were all below-average when they started the programme.

Case Studies



Areeb

Described by his tutor as an 'enthusiastic' and 'energetic' student with 'an amazing imagination,' Areeb made phenomenal progress across the programme, in English and Maths!

In his very first lesson at Tutors United, Areeb, imagining himself at the ripe, old age of 25 years old, wrote a letter to his tutor saying:

'I am very happy that you helped me with everything I have learnt in the past and made everything easier for me. Firstly, you helped me in English where I was struggling in writing stories, and you really helped me make my stories so much better and helped me use punctuation so much better using colons, semicolon and many more.

Secondly, in maths, you helped me do long division, long multiplication, chunking and many more. [sic]'

Little did Areeb know that his letter would come true so soon! With above 80% attendance and a consistently positive attitude to learning, Areeb made outstanding progress of 91.3% in Maths between the beginning and end of the programme.

Mastering nasty number sequences and tackling dreadful division sums, Areeb's Maths score leapt from 38.3% to 73.3% - impressively, that is going from 11.7 percentage points below average to only 1.7 percentage points away from above average.

Similarly, in English, Areeb's writing improved by one whole level from a year-related expectation of Year 3S to an expectation of Year 4S – what a mega-superstar!?



Farida

Farida made huge progress in English throughout the year. With English being her second language it is understandable that she found the subject tricky. At the start of the programme, Farida scored a 4E on her initial English assessment and progressed by

1.1 levels, exceeding the national expected rate of progression of 2 sub-levels per academic year to achieve a 5S. Farida should be exceptionally proud of her achievements, because the Tutors United team sure are!



Anand

When Anand first enrolled in the Tutors United programme, it was with the goal of increasing his confidence and getting him to focus more on Maths. Well, this goal was definitely reached and through Anand's and his parents' commitment and almost 100% attendance across 3 terms, he

went from strength to strength. In Maths, Anand's progress was undeniable with him scoring 38.8% on his initial Maths assessment increasing to a phenomenal 63.9% on his final Maths assessment. If that is not the power of confidence then we do not know what is!
